Welcome to the RiteCare Language Center of Orange County! We sincerely hope that everyone is staying safe and healthy. Fall is over and the RiteCare Language Center of Orange County is back in full operations with both in person therapy and teletherapy.

Based on our very detailed Site-Specific plan we are approved to open for one day a week at our Santa Ana center. Prior to opening the Center received a thorough and deep cleaning to ensure we

started germ free. Cleaning has become a very regular part of our activities at the Center and will continue as long as needed. All the therapy rooms are equipped with protective plexiglass screens. Full face screens and face masks are also used to help keep every safe. Additionally, the Supervisors and Student Clinicians have received training to ensure that all procedures outlined in the site-specific plan are followed.

Along with the 15 children enrolled for in person therapy we also have 29 children enrolled to receive Teletherapy. When the COVID outbreak started Teletherapy was quickly adopted so we could continue helping children overcome their communication challenges. Teletherapy is a great tool that allows our Student Clinicians to maintain a



strong connection with our families and children.

Contemplation

Greetings, brothers. I'm sure you'll join me in welcoming what I hope with be a mild and pleasant Autumn.

In keeping with the harvest, and the seasonal winding down of things, this month's theme is "Contemplation." And boy do we have a lot to contemplate in 2020.

Synonymous with the term "contemplation" is the word "reflection," which — as many of us know — is a central theme of Scottish Rite Freemasonry.

Contemplation, reflection, meditation: These are key tenets of the 4° - 14° degrees that comprise the Lodge of Perfection.

We also have the concept of the **Chamber of Reflection**: A small, darkened room of considerably somber atmosphere adjoining the Lodge. It's a place where candidates and masons alike are encouraged to sit and contemplate the universal truths of their existence. Time, impermanence, and duty.

The concept of the Chamber of Reflection likely started in France in the mid-18th century and is considered a Rosicrucian influence on Masonry. It has remained virtually unchanged in the two-and-a-half centuries that have ensued.

A traditional Chamber is appointed with a variety of implements intended to aid the occupant in their meditations. <u>Borrowing from an article</u> written by Brother Bryan Godwin of <u>Culver City Foshay No. 467 F. & A.M.</u>, they are:

The Mirror

Literally a reflection of yourself, and traditionally a trigger for a meditative state. Representing duality, and the "twilight" of the moment that the candidate is in between his life before Freemasonry, and the transformation in which he is about to partake.

The Hourglass

A Memento Mori in many traditions, the hourglass overtly represents the finite amount of time that we are given in our Earthly life. On a more esoteric level it can be seen to represent the upper and lower, showing the cycle of life and death and the separation of Heaven and Earth. The possibility of turning the glass, symbolizes our need at times, to reverse our attitudes and actions for continuity, or we shall always be drawn to one end; the base.

The Scythe

It is another reminder of our Earthly mortality and the thought that a man may be cut down from this existence at any moment. It may also be interpreted as an emblem of universal justice, that "as we sow, so shall we reap."

Salt

Salt represents base matter, or body, rough and impure. It can be seen as representing the Earthly self ready to be purified. It is one of the three essential alchemical elements, also known as the "Tria Prima."



Sulphur

Sulphur represents the soul, and essence above. It also also representative of fire, and sometimes referred to as the "Red King" in practical alchemy. Sulphur is the second essential alchemical element.

The Cockerel

The Cockerel, or rooster, symbolizes the alchemical principle of mercury which creates a fluid connection between the salt below and the sulphur above. It represents the human spirit, which in this case can be differentiated from the "soul," and represents a fluidity of spirit between the essence above and the firmament below. When partnered with salt and sulphur, the resulting mixture can be thought to symbolise faith, hope and charity.

Bread and Water

Two items connected to the simplest method of sustaining life. This simplicity is a reminder of how the candidate should proceed in all his dealings through life. They are also a reminder that "Man does not live by bread alone – but by the Word of the Living God".

V.I.T.R.I.O.L.

Vitriol is another name for sulphuric acid, which at first glance seems to bring a negative connotation. This acid was used in alchemical experiments as a way to break down or purify other matter. In this case, V.I.T.R.I.O.L. is also an acronym, for "visita interiora terrae, rectificando, invenies occultum lapidem", or "Visit the interior of the earth, and purifying it, you will find the hidden stone." This is another way of saying "Look within yourself for the truth." Both meanings



encourage the candidate to breakdown the ego and himself to find purity and truth within.

Human skull and crossed thighbones

The history of the skull and crossbones is murky, and worthy of its own discussion. In the case of the Chamber, it is a bleak reminder of what we will all eventually become. It represents the alchemical concept of "Caput Mortuum," signifying a useless substance left over from a chemical operation, such as sublimation and the epitome of decline and decay; alchemists represented this residue with a stylized human skull, a literal death's head.

It is possible that a contemplative mason might create a Chamber of Reflection of their own. A room in your house or apartment for the purposes of meditation on the great mysteries and duties of masonic life, appropriately appointed. Maybe skip the human skull and thigh bones, though; go with something more... synthetic.

Masonic Education

As you know, our **Master Craftsman Study Group** will not be meeting in person this month. That does not excuse us from scholarly study, however! On the contrary, with extra time on your hands at home, I strongly encourage you to continue your journey in Masonic education. Council for grading. As each quiz is completed, a new one is sent and the program progresses. The course consists of 7 quizzes, after completion of which the successful participant will receive a certificate and a lapel pin.

The Scottish Rite Master Craftsman: Symbolic Lodge course will familiarize students with aspects of the development of Blue Lodge Masonry and explore some of its developing symbolism. This will reveal that the "High Degrees" began to develop soon after formation of the Premier Grand Lodge (1717). Albert Pike's book, Esoterika: The Symbolism of the Blue Degrees of Freemasonry, along with Arturo de Hoyos' Scottish Rite Ritual Monitor & Guide (3d edition) will be used to demonstrate a rational and philosophical interpretation for much of what is found in Craft Masonry.

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
