The Work That Shapes Men: The Philosophical & Chivalric Degrees

Brethren and Valley Family,

In the Scottish Rite, the Council of Kadosh is where the work becomes both practical and deeply personal. It is the third of the four coordinate bodies, encompassing the Nineteenth through the Thirtieth Degrees, collectively known as the Philosophical and Chivalric Degrees. In plain terms, this is the part where we introduce the questions and knowledge that encourage a man to examine his convictions, strengthen his moral courage, and translate lofty principles into lived character.

These degrees challenge us to look inward, to cultivate virtue with intention, and to hold ourselves to higher standards in our homes, our work, and our dealings with others. The aim is to deepen a Mason's understanding of his duties to himself, his fellow man, and the Divine, encouraging a life marked by integrity, service, and the steady pursuit of further light.

As Commander of Kadosh, my role is to preside over this body and keep the work moving, steady, organized, and welcoming. That means supporting our officers, strengthening our work behind the scenes, and ensuring that newer Scottish Rite Masons are not left to figure out where to go next on their own. So, if you are new to our Valley, or you have been away for a while, consider this your on-ramp. Come, reacclimate yourself, and let us plug you into the men, the fellowship, and the work that will keep all of us growing.

February is a fitting month for that reset. It carries Valentine's Day, a reminder that brotherly love is not sentiment; it is a practice. It is also the season of Washington's Birthday, February 22, 1732, an opportunity to reflect on principled leadership and the kind of civic-minded Masonry that still matters.

Come break bread, reconnect, and let him learn what the work in the higher degrees can provide—not only knowledge but also direction. Brent Morris, 33°, GC, discussed this some years back, and that discussion led to the formation of the Scottish Rite Research Society. Despite extensive research, the complete answer is unknown. The learned scholars ultimately concluded that, like many parts of Masonic history, the reason is lost.




Sip, Sail, & Sisterhood: Blue Slipper Club February Notes

Shepheard's Tavern

III. Ralph C. Shelton II, 33°

Inscription: On this site stood Shepheard's Tavern, The birthplace of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry, The Mother Supreme Council of the World, May 31, 1801

Shepheard's Tavern — sometimes called Swallow's Tavern, The City Tavern, or The Corner Tavern — stood at the northeast corner of Broad and Church on Broad Street in Charleston, South Carolina. In the 18th century, it was one of the city's busiest public rooms, a meeting place where merchants hashed out deals, neighbors swapped news, and Masons gathered for ritual and fellowship. The tavern doubled as a post office and served as a formal reception point for visiting royal governors; in 1801, it famously became the birthplace of Scottish Rite Freemasonry in America. Today, the corner is occupied by the brick SouthState Bank building. The old tavern's memory survives in local stories and in the layered streetscape of downtown Charleston, which serves as a lasting symbol of the city's public life, its gatherings, and its many historical moments.



Are Knights also Stewards?

I have been pondering the concept of stewardship lately, and this question naturally arose in my thoughts. First, I had to determine what defines a steward, then what I believe defines a good steward, and finally how those definitions relate to what makes a good knight—and how all of that translates into action. It turned out to be far less simple than I initially expected.

My first search was for a dictionary definition of steward. The most common definition describes a steward as a person in charge of serving people, providing products and/or food at special events, clubs, and similar gatherings. That is not what we Knights of Saint Andrew actually do, although we are always happy to step in and help with such tasks—as all members of the Rite will, and in my opinion, should be happy to do. However, to my mind, that definition is limited and incomplete at best.

I asked AI, and it offered deeper, broader definitions that aligned more closely with my own understanding of stewardship. In my own words, a steward is someone entrusted with something important and valuable, ensuring it is well cared for and kept functioning at its best. Stewards do not act out of personal gain, but out of a desire to

ensure that organizations, communities, and future generations can continue to benefit from what has been placed under their care.

Good stewardship also requires planning for sustainability and long-term outcomes, not just the short-term or the immediate moment. A good steward greets and engages with many people, never knowing who might later become a benefit, a friend, or a brother. Good stewards build and cultivate relationships, strengthen connections, and spread harmony and truth through the way they care for what they do. Stewards are answerable for how they manage what has been entrusted to them. Their role is rooted in trust.

Ultimately, I believe that being a good steward is similar to being an ambassador. A good steward, like an ambassador, is a respected representative—someone who acts in the best interest of their company, agency, group, Lodge, or Valley, supporting and promoting it. They meet, greet, and engage with many people, never knowing who might later become a benefit, a friend, or a brother. Good stewards build and cultivate relationships, strengthen connections, and spread harmony and truth through their actions.

Having now studied the concept of stewardship more deeply, I have concluded that all Masons—from the first step to the highest, regardless of title or position—should consider themselves stewards. How can we not be all of these things to our world, country, state, lodge, family, friends, and fellow human beings?

How can we then be good stewards? How do we put these concepts into action? Quite simply, I believe we do so by showing up when we say we will, completing the tasks we commit to in a timely manner, and approaching everything we do with the expectation that it will be done well and to the best of our ability. Being a good steward also means asking for assistance when needed and always acting in the best interest of something larger than ourselves. In doing so, we build trust—one of the most vital qualities we can offer to those around us—and we encourage others to be as trustworthy as we strive to be.

So, to answer my title question, “Are Knights also Stewards?” the answer is a resounding yes. I personally hold myself, as a Knight of Saint Andrew, to a higher code and expectation, especially in the capacity of a steward. I believe it is an elevated and honorable position—one worthy of all that makes a good man a better one.
