The Work Begins Here

Brethren and Valley Family,

With our nation's 250th anniversary upon us, I've found myself reflecting on the kind of men who laid the foundation for our Republic, knowing that future generations would build upon it.

Whether they wore aprons or uniforms is almost beside the point. What mattered was that they believed some things were worth preserving, even when doing so required sacrifice, courage, and a willingness to place principle above self-interest.

Since assuming this chair, I've gained a deeper appreciation for the responsibility that comes with the office. It has also caused me to reflect more deeply on what the 30° really asks of us as Scottish Rite Masons.

I think the 30° asks something much more difficult of us than we may understand on the surface. If we look beyond the ritual and symbolism for a moment, I believe it asks whether we have the courage to defend truth, justice, and integrity in our everyday lives. Most of us will never be asked to defend those ideals on a battlefield. We will, however, be asked to defend them in our homes, our workplaces, our lodges, our communities, and ultimately as citizens of a free nation.

Those principles aren't preserved through speeches alone. They're preserved through the way we live, serve, and treat one another every day.

Sometimes it's the simple moments that remind us what those principles actually look like. Our inaugural Orange County Scottish Rite Fellowship Breakfast was one of those moments. I'd like to again recognize Worshipful Miguel Perez and the brethren of Garden Grove Lodge No. 351 for welcoming us so warmly.

While the food was great, this first event wasn't memorable just because of the menu. It was memorable because of the conversations and the camaraderie. Good fellowship reminds us that growth as a Mason doesn't come from perfect ritual or by standing on a stage. More often than not, it comes over breakfast, a cup of coffee, or simply taking the time to get to know a brother outside of a formal setting.

The same thought came to mind during our recent Cap and Ring Ceremony. I was genuinely pleased to see several of our newest 32° brethren return to receive this well-earned recognition. At the same time, I couldn't help but wish we had seen every member of the class there.

The cap and ring aren't a graduation ceremony. If anything, they should flip a switch in each of us. To me, they're a reminder that Scottish Rite has more to offer than degrees. It offers opportunities to serve. Receiving your cap isn't the end of the journey. It's the beginning of giving something back in a new and meaningful way as a Mason.

That's my hope for every brother who has recently joined our ranks. Don't let your journey end with receiving the degrees or your cap and ring. Become part of a degree team. Volunteer at an event. Mentor a Blue Lodge brother

who has asked about the higher degrees and would benefit from taking the next step into our Valley. Help support our RiteCare Childhood Language Center. Find a place, and don't be afraid to roll up those sleeves.

The Valley doesn't become stronger simply because more brothers join. It becomes stronger because more brethren choose to become involved, strengthen one another, deepen their understanding of the higher degrees, and ultimately... get to work.

As we reflect on our nation's 250th anniversary, I believe that's something each of us should consider. The liberties we enjoy today were secured by men who believed future generations were worth investing in. Our Valley gives us the opportunity to do much the same.

As Commander, I can't think of a better legacy for us than to see each new class become more active than the one before it. None of us knows what this Valley will look like twenty-five years from now. But every time we mentor a brother, volunteer for an event, serve on a degree team, or simply show up when we're needed, we're helping shape that future.

Simply put, if your cap and ring inspire you to do just a little more than you did yesterday, then they've already served their purpose.
