Brethren,

In my last newsletter article, I wrote about the importance of the work that we do and, more importantly, getting to work. At the time, I believed I understood what that meant. Then I went to our House of the Temple in Washington, D.C., and found that my understanding deepened while my perspective widened.

Earlier this month, I had the privilege of traveling to Washington, D.C., as one of four Brothers from our Orient selected to participate in our Sovereign Grand Commander's Fellows Program. I returned home with seven pages of notes, several new friendships, more ideas than I know what to do with, and a considerably deeper understanding of something I had already been contemplating.

The executive summary of those seven pages: the work is never really finished; it simply takes us higher up the mountain and deeper into the quarries. Perhaps more importantly, every new opportunity we are given brings with it an even greater responsibility to do something worthy with it.

There is a decidedly Kadosh lesson in all of that. The knightly ideal has never been about the decoration worn by the Knight, but rather the obligation he accepts. I look forward to seeing you receive your caps and rings at our next Stated Meeting. Wear them proudly, but remember what they represent: not a destination reached, but another door opened.

We have also seen a practical example of that lesson this month through our Fellowship Breakfast at Solomon's Staircase No. 357, bringing Brothers together in fellowship while supporting one of the Blue Lodges of our Valley.

The event itself may not seem particularly esoteric, but perhaps that is precisely the point. The lessons we receive in our degrees are only symbols until we carry them beyond the walls of the Temple. Fellowship, service, mentorship, and simply showing up for one another are where those symbols become practice.

I went to our House of the Temple expecting to learn something new. Instead, I came home understanding something familiar much more deeply: what we receive matters far less than what we do with what has been entrusted to us.

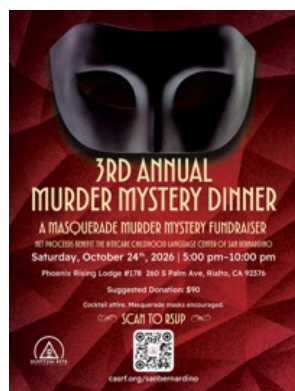

The Eleven Gentlemen of Charleston: A New Master



Craftsman Course on the Founders of the Mother Council

Most Scottish Rite Masons know the phrase "Mother Supreme Council of the World." Ask them who founded it and the room tends to go quiet. A new course from the Scottish Rite Master Craftsman program takes up that question.

The Eleven Gentlemen of Charleston: A Study on the Founding of the Mother Council of the World covers the lives of the eleven men who established the Supreme Council of the 33rd Degree in Charleston in 1801, and the events that led them to do it.

They were an unlikely group. Among them were military officers, physicians, merchants, scholars, clergy, and a diplomat or two. Some were Christian, and some were Jewish. Some were American-born, and some had come from Europe or the Caribbean. Charleston at the turn of the nineteenth century didn't offer many places where men like that sat together as equals. The lodge was one of them.

The course takes each founder in turn, covering his background, profession, and standing in the city, and then looks at how the group worked together to build the Supreme Council. From there, it moves to what the rest of us inherited from them: the historical significance of the Charleston founding, the legitimacy the Supreme Council has carried since, and the philosophical foundations that the degrees still teach. If you've wondered why the Rite is organized the way it is, or on what authority it rests, this is where the answer starts.

The course draws on two sources. The first is the 225th Anniversary edition of Ray Baker Harris's Eleven Gentlemen of Charleston, the standard study of the founders. The second is the 2026 documentary The Eleven Gentlemen, which brings the story to the screen.

About the Master Craftsman program

The Eleven Gentlemen of Charleston is part of the Scottish Rite Master Craftsman course catalog. Since 2008, Master Craftsman has offered mail-in and online correspondence courses in Masonic history, ritual, and philosophy, and thousands of brothers have taken them.

The Master Craftsman Online College & Leadership Academy is a multimedia learning system designed by Masons for Masons. Students choose from Masonic education and leadership courses and track their progress along the way. It works on any device, so you can study whenever you have the time. New courses come out regularly.

We spend a lot of time talking about what Freemasonry makes of good men. This course looks at what eleven of them made of Freemasonry, and it's still standing 225 years later.

The Degrees are at the heart of the Scottish Rite experience, and maintaining the quality, consistency, and integrity of their presentation is essential to communicating the lessons they contain. We look forward to working with III. Quimpo as this effort moves forward and to doing our part here in Orange County Valley to preserve and strengthen our ritual for the generations that follow.

We also owe an enormous thank you to everyone who rolled up their sleeves and volunteered at our Orange International Street Fair Funnel Cake Booth. This was our Valley's first year taking on this ambitious project, and our Brothers, families, and friends responded magnificently. As a direct result of that hard work, Orange County Valley will be making a \$10,000 donation to our Language Center program, helping support the vital speech and language services provided to children and families in our community. At the same time, the Street Fair has demonstrated its potential to become our Valley's major annual fundraiser, providing meaningful support both for our Language Center program and for the operating needs of Orange County Valley.

A project of this magnitude does not simply happen, and special recognition must go to Erin McKinley, Kat Price, Bro. Barry McKinley, 32°, and Bro. Don Anchetta, 32°, who put this effort together and worked tirelessly to make it a success. Their experience, planning, organization, and countless hours of work gave the rest of us the opportunity to step in and help execute a remarkably successful first year. Quite simply, without Erin, Kat, Barry, and Don, this would not have happened. On behalf of the Valley, thank you for taking an idea and turning it into what promises to become an Orange County Valley tradition.

Between welcoming ten new Masters of the Royal Secret, renewing our commitment to excellence in our ritual, and seeing what can happen when our members come together in service to a common purpose, there is a great deal of positive energy in Orange County Valley. It is another reminder that our strength lies not simply in what we do, but in doing it together. That is the Fellowship-First spirit that continues to make Orange County Valley the crossroads of Masonry in Orange County.
